

Diana Reigelsperger is Associate Professor of History at Seminole State College. She earned her Ph.D. in History from the University of Florida, where she also completed a graduate certificate in Latin American Studies. Her research focuses on Spanish Florida, the eighteenth-century Atlantic World, migration, intercultural relations, and networks of trade and exchange across colonial borders. Her recent work has examined Anglo-Spanish trade, contraband networks, migration, and illicit travel in eighteenth-century Florida and the broader Atlantic world.

Her publications include articles in *The Latin Americanist*, *Florida Historical Quarterly*, and *El Escribano*, as well as reference essays for *Oxford Bibliographies in Latin American Studies* and *Great Events in Religion*. Her current work includes a chapter on Indigenous Florida and the Gulf South for the forthcoming *Cambridge History of the Caribbean* and a manuscript project, *Fortune Favors the Bold: Networks of Trade and Migration Between Florida and the Atlantic World*.

Reigelsperger also regularly brings Florida history to public audiences through invited lectures and community programs. Her presentations have addressed subjects ranging from marriage and family in colonial Florida to piracy, tavern life, migration, and the changing landscape of modern Florida. She previously served as a member of the Florida Humanities Council Speakers Bureau, now Florida Talks.

Reigelsperger serves on the Academic Advisory Council for *La Florida: The Interactive Digital Archive of the Americas* and has participated in professional service for the *Florida Historical Quarterly*. Her scholarship and teaching emphasize Florida's place within the wider histories of the Caribbean, Latin America, and the Atlantic World.
